

Module Handbook for the Master's Programme Multilingualism

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I. General Information

Participants in the Master's Programme *Multilingualism* acquire knowledge and skills to deal with many aspects of multilingualism and multilingual acquisition, including linguistic, psycholinguistic, and sociological perspectives. Acquaintance with major scientific findings and their interpretation, relevant analytical skills, and the development of critical thinking play important roles. These competencies are becoming increasingly important in view of our global and multilingual societies. The acquired skills and abilities are relevant for academic work as well as for scientifically informed, responsible, non-academic work. The programme prepares for academic as non-academic careers.

II. Targeted Qualifications

Specialized goals of the Programme

Participants become acquainted with the several phases of language acquisition and the associated terminology, as used from the perspectives of linguistics, sociology and pedagogy. They understand the factors that condition acquisition in various situations, starting from multilingual first-language acquisition, through childhood and adult second-language acquisition, as individual phenomena (e.g., on the psycholinguistic and neuronal level) and as social phenomena (e.g., in processes of language contact, conservation and formation of minority languages).

They become acquainted with current research questions and methods employed in multilingualism research, and they are able to pose original research problems, to obtain and evaluate reliable data, and to interpret these data in the light of current research hypotheses. They can present their knowledge in oral and written forms. In non-academic settings they can apply their knowledge to evaluate practical problems critically and to implement solutions.

General goals of the Programme

Working in the specialized field of multilingualism research, participants develop the following, non-specialized skills:

- They can follow presentations of complex material
- They can critically analyse various forms of texts and presentations
- They can present specialized subject matter to non-specialists in an understandable way
- They can construct logically coherent arguments
- They can analyse, manage and visualize complex data

• They can extract the essential points from a complex assemblage of information Working independently, they can produce clearly formulated, well-structured and stylistically concise presentations, in oral and written form.

III. Outline of the Master's Programme in Multilingualism

For the Master's Programme Multilingualism, 120 ECTS¹ credits (cr) must be earned, of which 111 cr shall be obtained in the core areas and 9 cr in the supplementary areas (Module 6). A semester abroad or an internship is obligatory in the third semester (Module 5); in cases of special hardship, where these are not possible, and at the discretion of the department, additional courses amounting to 21 cr from Modules 3, 4 or 6 may be substituted.
